




Thursday, May 3 **Pray for America**—**UNITY**

Our theme this year is based upon Ephesians 4:3 which challenges us to mobilize unified public prayer for America, "Making every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace."

The National Day of Prayer is an annual observance held on the first Thursday of May, inviting people of all faiths to pray for the nation. It was created in 1952 by a joint resolution of the United States Congress, and signed into law by President Harry S. Truman. Every president since 1952 has signed a National Day of Prayer proclamation.

The National Day of Prayer Task Force is a privately funded organization whose purpose is to encourage participation on the National Day of Prayer. It exists to communicate with every individual the need for personal repentance and prayer, to create appropriate materials, and to mobilize the Christian community to intercede for America's leaders and its families. The Task Force is a Judeo-Christian expression of the national observance, based on our understanding that this country was birthed in prayer and in reverence for the God of the Bible.



A few weeks ago I was in a Christian bookstore looking for something new to read (I'm always on the lookout for something new from David Jeremiah, or some other theology scholar) when I noticed something was amiss: there weren't many books. Keep in mind, this was a bookstore, and yet the majority of it was filled with knick-knacks and gifts, and all sorts of other things... but few books. Adding to my confusion, when I asked for the theology section, the attendant took me to a single shelf about 24 inches long and informed me that was all they had. I was shocked! This is a Christian bookstore after all, and they have almost nothing on Christian theology. I proceeded to ask why there was not more, to which I was told, "Our customers just aren't interested in theology anymore." I responded by asking what their customers were interested in, and was told the majority of their sales go to gifts (coffee cups, pencils, etc.), music, and fiction literature. Please don't misunderstand me, I enjoy this store and they are wonderful people, but what does it say about the current season of faith in the church when Christians aren't motivated to learn Christianity?

From what I learned at the Christian bookstore, it would appear the Christian church may be feeling a little less motivated than in the past. Perhaps it's the result of constant bombardment from the world. Perhaps it's because the world has grown colder to the church and it's easier to just bundle up and stay inside. Whatever the case, it seems as if the Christian church needs a boost of energy.

So let me encourage you, as we come into this summer and we start venturing outside and getting schedules back on track, to make time to also grow in your faith. And that is my prayer for you and for our church: that we would be energetically seeking to grow warmer in our relationship and our knowledge of Jesus Christ (2 Peter 3:18) to the point we are on fire for God! With the warmer temperatures and the increased motivation to get moving, I pray you would let that also flow into your spiritual life and invigorate you for God.

The Preschool Clothing Drive collected 3,588 pounds and earned \$719.92 for the Preschool.



Council of Elders

According to the New Testament, elders are responsible for the spiritual leadership and oversight of a church. We read in 1st Timothy 3:2-3 some of the qualifications of an elder; they must be above reproach, soberminded, self-controlled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, not a drunkard, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money. Here at Shepherd of the Hills we have been blessed with a group of elders who exemplify these characteristics and are committed to the spiritual wellbeing of the church.

The Elders of the church, once selected, serve for life. They hold monthly meetings to discuss important spiritual issues and discern God's will for the congregation. Their primary responsibilities, according to scripture, are to teach sound doctrine, lead through service, model the Christian lifestyle, and pray for the congregation. We can summarize the responsibilities of an elder this way: they seek to shepherd the congregation as Jesus shepherded his disciples.
